

Welcome to the *South Salt Creek Neighborhood*

History: The original plat of Lincoln in 1867 included 100 blocks within the South Salt Creek neighborhood. Substantial residential development began in the 1880's with the arrival of large numbers of Germans from Russia. Other ethnic groups have also settled in South Salt Creek, making diversity one of its greatest assets.

Schools: South Salt Creek elementary students are served by Everett, Saratoga, and Yankee Hill schools. Middle school students attend Park and high school students are served by Lincoln High or Lincoln Southeast.

Recreational Opportunities: Neighborhood parks include Cooper, Sawyer Snell, Schwartzkopf, and Standing Bear Grounds. The F Street Recreation Center offers basketball courts, pool and Ping-Pong tables, and a variety of other family-oriented activities. Neighborhood skaters can enjoy Holiday Skate World, baseball players can run the bases at Sherman Field, soccer players can kick in comfort at the indoor soccer field, while tennis enthusiasts can practice their serves at a tennis court at 606 Hill Street. Wilderness and Pioneer Parks are within easy access, providing horseback riding, sledding, cross-country skiing, and additional outdoor pleasures.

Services: A fire station at 2nd & N Streets helps to protect the neighborhood, while the Capitol Humane Society serves four-legged residents at 2320 Park Street.

Businesses: The neighborhood is bordered by the Haymarket's thriving commercial district on the north, while many small businesses within the neighborhood cater to residents' needs, including a printing shop, recycling center, and Laundromat.

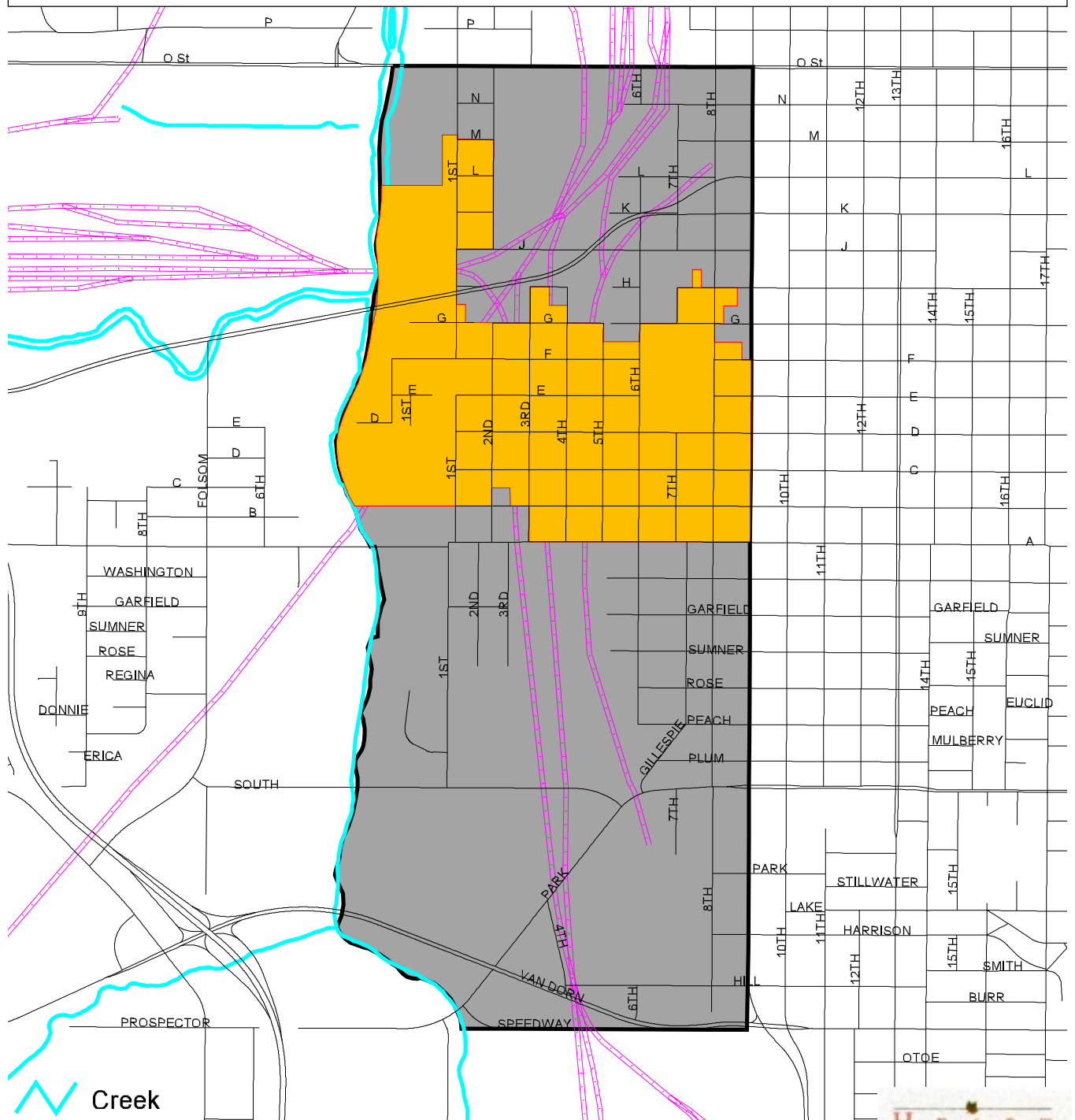

Historic Points of Interest: The William Tyler House at 8th & D Streets is an impressive stone and brick example of the Richardson Romanesque style. It was built in 1890-91 and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The First German Congregational Church at 1st & F Streets was built in 1920 to replace an earlier church built at 1st & J Streets by residents of German-Russian descent. Another neighborhood highlight is the South Bottoms Historic District, the home of the American Historical Society of Germans from Russia at 631 D Street that includes an archive, library, map collection, and special displays. The Heritage Center consists of summer kitchen, All-Faiths Chapel, country store, railroad caboose, and Amen Museum.

Neighborhood Activities: The South Salt Creek Neighborhood Organization is an active voice for neighborhood improvement. It sponsors an annual cleanup, picnic and potluck dinner, Easter egg hunt, and quarterly newsletter. It also participates in the UCIP, a neighborhood community improvement program.
